
Kevin Reilly Executive Vice President's Report 51st Annual Meeting Wednesday, December 2, 2020 4:00 pm The Lake Club

I would like to welcome everyone to the 51st Annual Meeting of The Builders Association of Eastern Ohio and Western Pennsylvania and thank you for your attendance today.

This afternoon you will hear various Association reports and you will also meet the 2021 Executive Committee members and officers that will lead the Association over the next year.

Included at everyone's table is a graph of man hours reported under Association negotiated labor agreements since the inception of the 5 County Builders Association. The hours reported are based on our fiscal year of October through September. As you can see from the graph, hours decreased again from the prior year. This year's reported man hours were 2,720,563, which is down 6.10% from the prior year. For some perspective when looking at the graph, the historical average hours are 3,669,305.

The next handout at your tables is a chart that shows the construction dollar volume, as reported by the *Dodge Local Construction Potentials Bulletin* and the man hours reported to the Association. As you can see, total non-residential construction through October of this year is \$589,199,000 which is up from the prior year. When you look at the breakdown of what comprises that figure, there are some bright spots but there is not as much diversity in projects as you would like to see. Hopefully over the next year we will see a reversal in the continued decline in the number of reported manhours.

All this contributed to the reduction in man hours.

The Association was forced to cancel some events and was unable to plan other events due to the uncertainty of what would be allowed and the quickly changing nature of the rules. We were able to hold some events during the time that the number of cases were declining however, as the number of cases has spiked significantly, the ability to hold and plan events has again become

problematic and necessitated the cancellation of this year's Annual Meeting.
